

Historically

The term **medical ethics** first dates back to **1803**, when English author and physician **Thomas Percival** published a document describing the **requirements and expectations** of medical professionals within medical facilities.

Historically

The Code of Medical Ethics (Code) of the American Medical Association (AMA) is rooted in an understanding of the goals of medicine as a **profession**, which dates back to the 5th century BC and the Greek physician **Hippocrates**, to relieve suffering and promote well-being in a relationship of fidelity with the patient.




Morality refers to the set of

standards that enable people to live

cooperatively in groups. It's what

societies determine to be "right"

and "acceptable."



Conformity

Is doing what everybody else doing, regardless of what is right



Morality

Is doing what is right, regardless of what everybody else is doing.



• Ethics is a set of principles of right conduct, such as those governing the actions of an individual or of a professional group, or the philosophy underlying such principles.

Definition

• Medical ethics deals with those ethical principles that govern professional conduct in medicine. Medical ethics implies obligations of the health professional toward the patient as well as some obligations towards other health professionals.

Definition

- The Greek word *ethike* means habit, action, character.
- The Latin word *mos (morals)* means habit or custom.
- In simple words, Ethics is a set of philosophical beliefs and practices concerned with the distinction between right and wrong.

Definition

Healthcare personnel (HCP) refers to all paid and unpaid persons serving in healthcare settings who have the potential for direct or indirect exposure to patients or infectious materials, including body substances (e.g., blood, tissue, and specific body fluids)



Definition

A health professional is a person trained to work in a health or health-related field. In most cases, a health professional will have received training to work in a specific mental or physical health field.

- Ethics is not science
